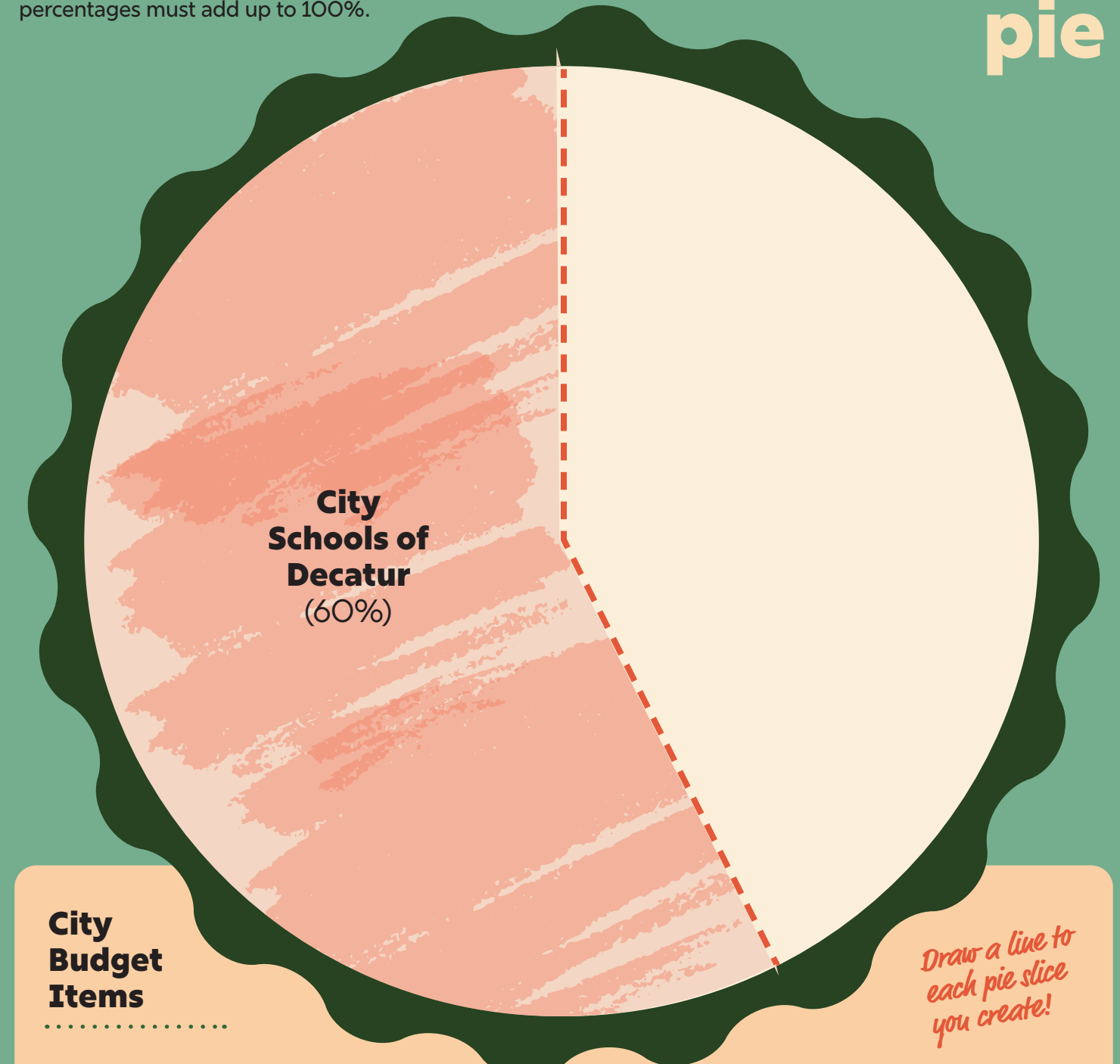

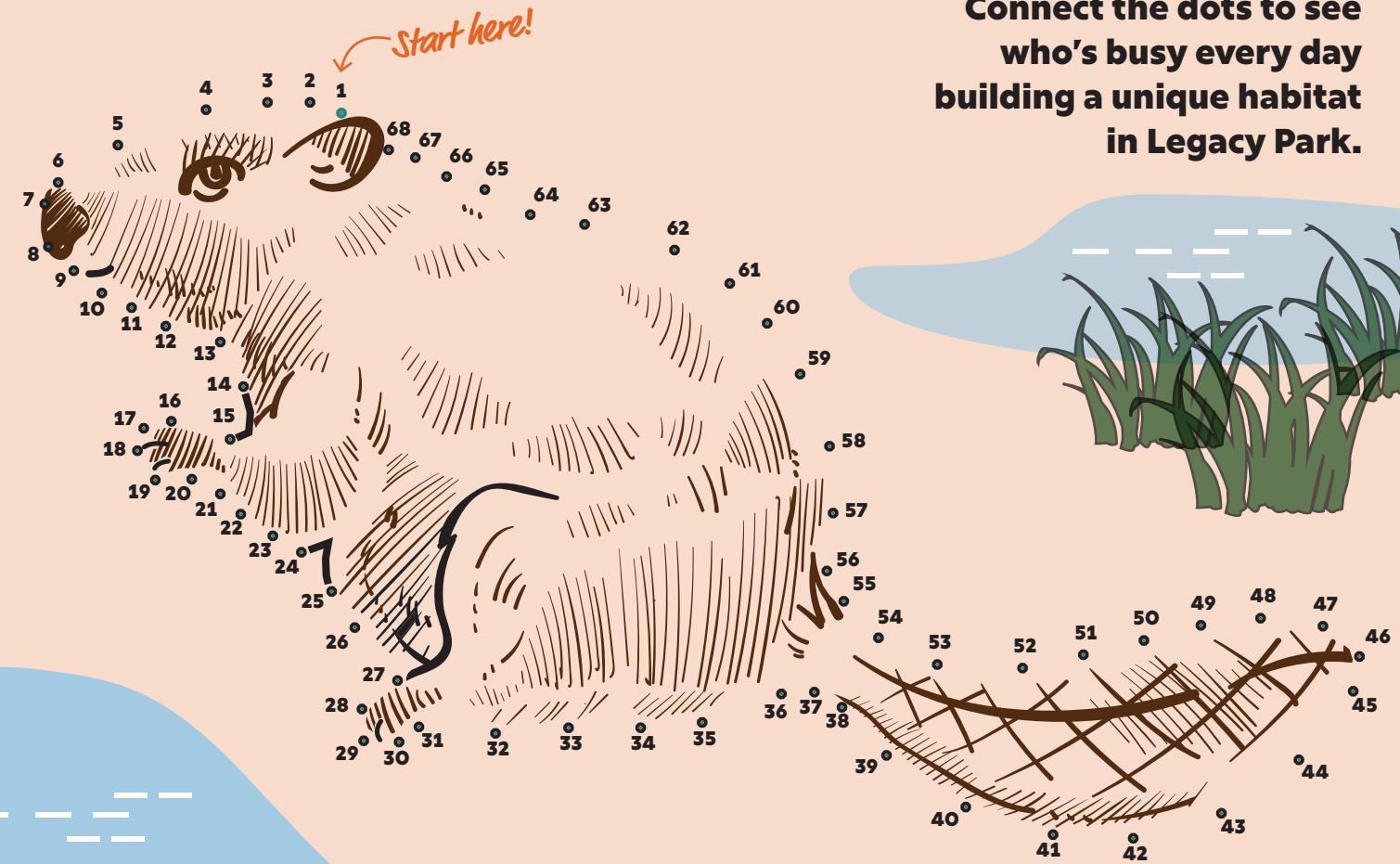

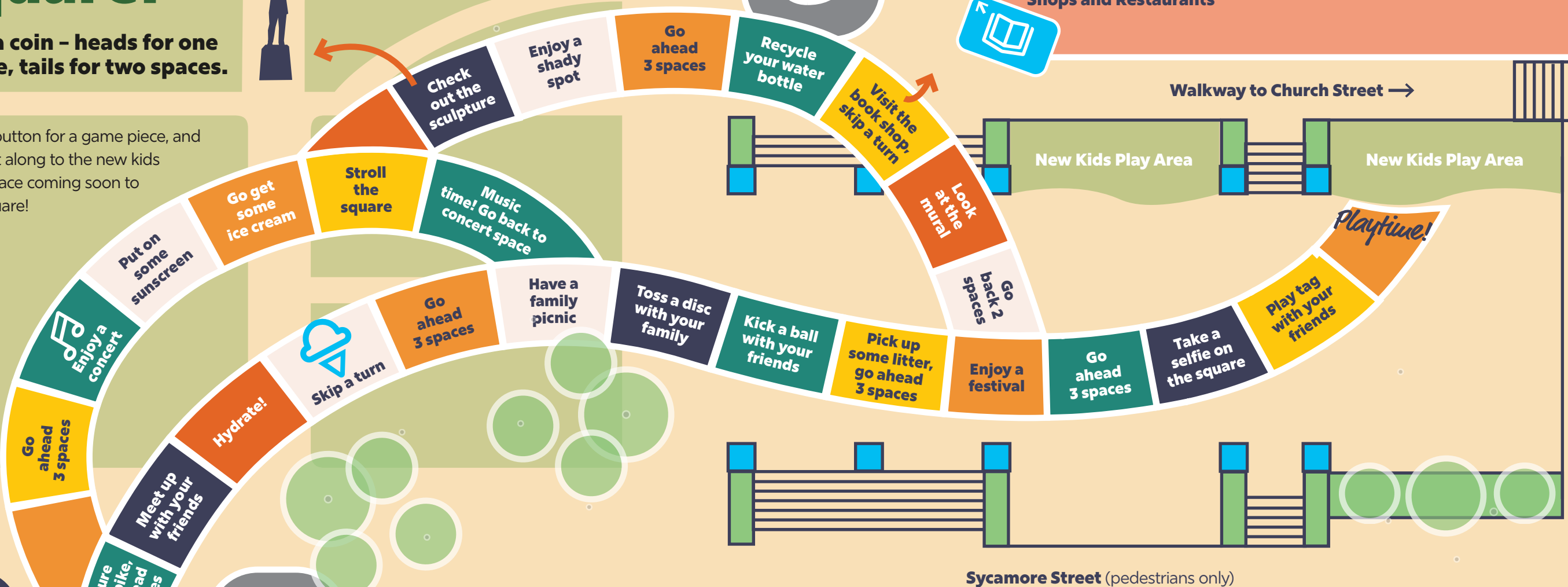


Flip a coin – heads for one space, tails for two spaces.

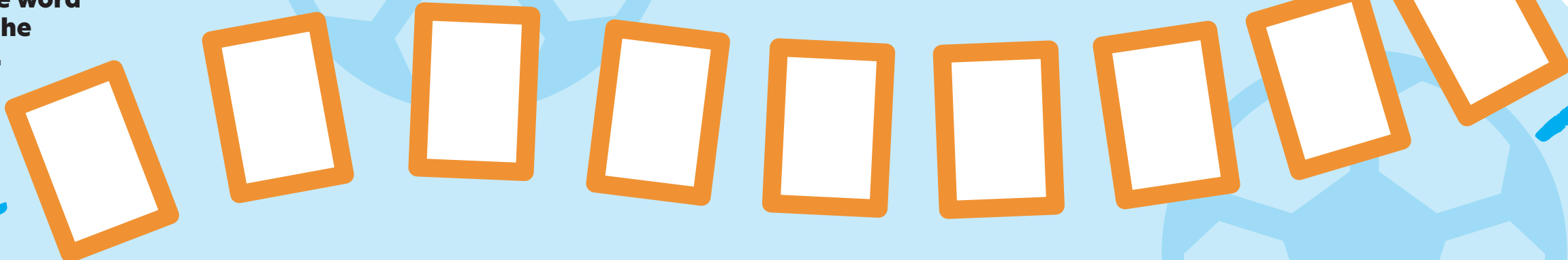

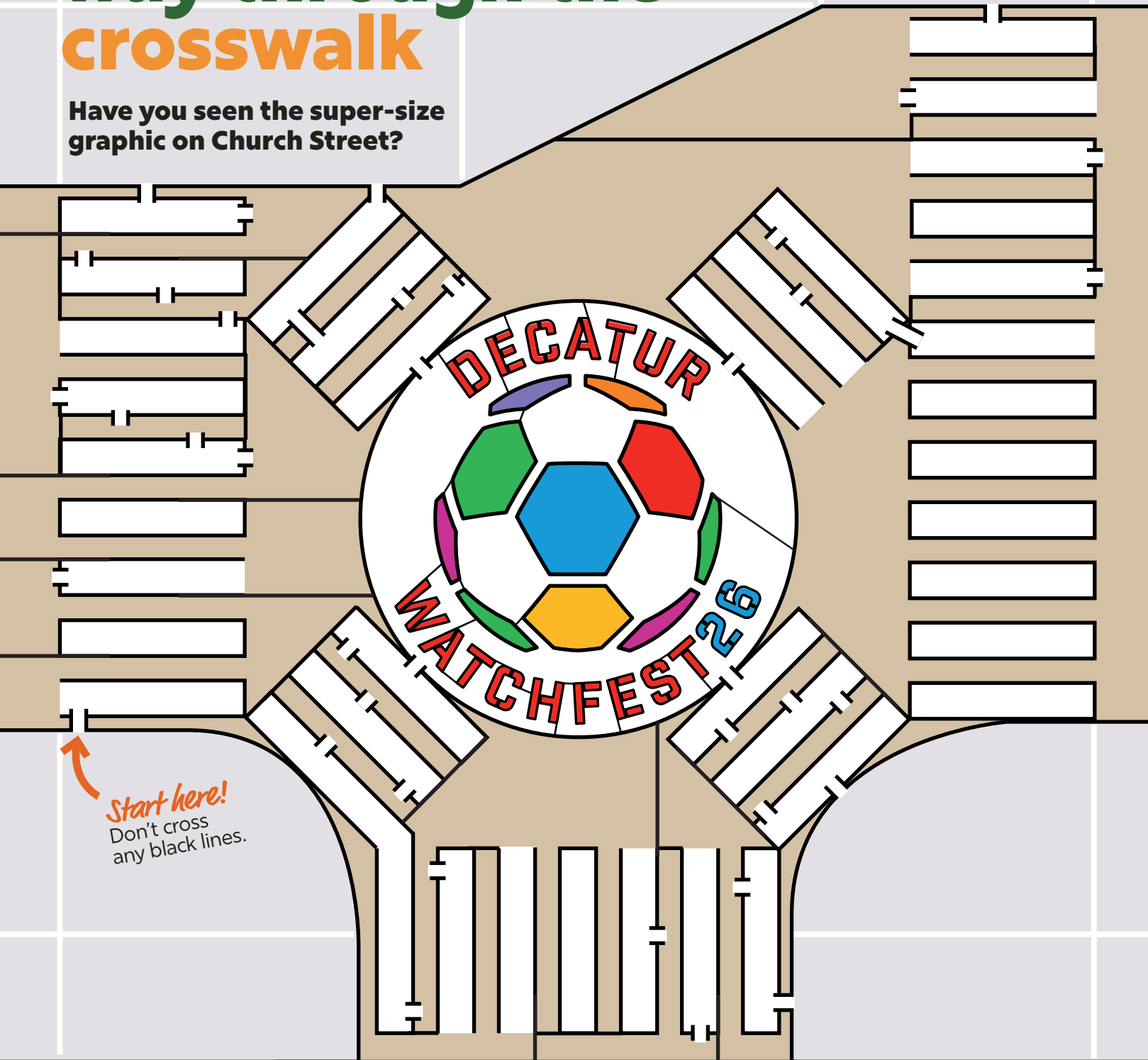
